Dear Friends,

Do you believe our mortality is a gift? I do. Because we do not have forever, time is precious. At Wings of Hope, one of the things we strive to do is help individuals become comfortable with their own mortality. Why is it important? Because this level of awareness creates a better quality of life.

I know that one day I will very likely become unable to make my own health care decisions. To plan for that, I have appointed a patient advocate (with first and second alternates if that person is not available). I have had a conversation with each of my patient advocates about what is important to me, and they each have a copy of my advance directive. They will see to it that my quality of life – as I define it – will be attended to.

What exactly does that mean? In plain language, it means if I am not making my own decisions and need to be cared for by other people, I want to be in my own home. I want a soothing environment with people I love and my pets in it. I do not want bright lights or people bending over me. I want it to be quiet. I want soft music and smells of home. I do not want my sheets or blankets tucked in. I want to be kept clean.

My patient advocates know that if it comes to a choice of quantity of life versus quality, quality wins.

Do you have your advance directive in place? If not and you do not know where to start, call Wings of Hope. We have the forms and the people trained to help you complete them in a way that is tailored to your choices. This service is free and confidential. We will meet with you in a place that is convenient for you.

I had the honor of being quoted in Time Magazine (9/17/18 issue) about advance directives. My quote was about the importance of getting advance directives complete <u>before</u> there is an emergency and difficult decisions have to be made in times of high stress and high emotion. A Man Who Lived His Faith By Greg Carlson

I had several conversations with Fred* and his family, but one stands out. His daughter Terry and I sat with Fred who reclined on his bed at the Wings Home. At age 71, he was a smiling man of slight build, quite bald with a few tufts of hair sticking out the sides of his head. It didn't take much for me to imagine him with a ball cap on as he drove a semi-truck – something he did for most of his working years.

He had been in an auto accident about a month previous. An exam at that time showed he had esophageal cancer that had spread throughout his body. Within a few short days he came to Wings of Hope and the Wings Home.

I think Fred was the most humble man I've known. Truly humble. When I asked if he would like our volunteer writer to come and write up his life story, he declined, saying he would not like to have himself be the center of attention; he would rather God get the credit for his life. Everything about him was humble: his demeanor, voice, eyes and words.

He was concerned that he always do God's will. One example of his life of faith was that he was a giver. He didn't tell me about this; Terry spoke humbly about her father's life of giving to those in need. She had come across some receipts mailed from several organizations that helped people in need. She told me how her dad had chosen to live his whole life without much material things in order to bless those who had needs. Just before his auto accident, he had been living with a brother in a small trailer – not a mobile home, but a small enclosed trailer. At that time, a friend had needed a coat. Fred had given him his coat – the only coat he had. He was glad it was a relatively warm autumn.

Now Fred lay dying. He was content with his lot in life – "the Lord has numbered my days," said he in a slight whisper – all he could muster as he spit up phlegm and blood from his esophageal cancer. As Terry and I leaned in to hear his words, he communicated with great effort: "All my life I have been able to give with great joy." I asked, "What brought you joy in your giving?" He said, "Mostly because I learned that no matter how much I gave, God always supplied more for me to give again."

He continued his thought with a smile: "But now I cannot give anymore. It is time for me to receive. I have been blessed by these many people that have given of their time and resources to Wings of Hope Hospice and the Wings Home. I feel loved here."

Terry and I agreed with him. "This is a house full of love."
